

- 300 boys & girls are currently waiting to be matched & some will wait up to 3 years!
- Majority of youth come from low income, single parent homes
- All youth have personally expressed a desire for a mentor
- By simply showing up, you can increase a child's self-confidence and attention to schoolwork
- You can decrease a child's chances of using illegal drugs, skipping school, and engaging in underage drinking
- Bigs and Littles are matched based on common interests
- Whether you play catch, watch a movie, or go to the library, those little moments have a big impact on kids and their lives AND CHANGE YOURS!

WHAT DO BIGS DO?

Site-based mentors - Meet with your Little at their school for about 45 minutes per week (or at least twice a month) during the child's lunch break.

Community-based mentors - Meet up with a child in your community two times per month to do things you both enjoy on days and times that are convenient for your schedule. You'll have exclusive access to tickets for concerts, sporting events and attractions, and be invited to match meet-ups, networking events, and training/workshops. Couples and families are invited to mentor a child together in this program, as well.

DO YOU HAVE WHAT IT TAKES?

- Are you at least 18 years old?
- Have you lived in Arizona for at least three months and have a valid AZ drivers license?
- Do you like to do stuff like eat pizza, play video games, watch movies, hike and have fun?
- Will you continue to do stuff in Arizona for the next year?
- Can you pass a background check?

Become a Site-Based Mentor



Help a child succeed during your lunch break

Mentors meet with their Little Brother or Little Sister at a nearby elementary school for about 45 minutes per week (or at least twice a month) at the child's school. Youth and mentors spend time playing games, working on homework or hanging out on the playground together.


Why I Volunteer!
